Home Reading Program

Weekly Routine for First and Second Grade

- Monday Child reads their first book. Parent initials "First reading!" column.
- Tuesday Child **rereads** their first story. Parent initials "Reread it!" column.
- Wednesday Child reads their second book. Parent initials "First reading!" column.
- Thursday Child **rereads** their second story. Parent initials "Reread it!" column.
- Friday Return your book bag with your books, reading log, and pencil to your teacher.



Keys to Success

- Keep the book bag in your child's backpack at all times!
 Only ask your child to remove the book bag during their reading time and to provide your parent signature.
 Then, immediately return it to the backpack.
- Think about and set up a daily schedule that works for your family (i.e. right after school or before bath time)
- Use Alexa or Google Home to set daily reminders.
- Only allow computer/TV/device time after reading time.

Incentives

1st and 2nd grade students must return a **minimum** of two signed reading logs to receive participation credit each month.

Participants will be announced at Share and Shine. Monthly prizes will be awarded and raffle winners will be announced the day after our Share and Shine celebrations.



Why a reading program?

During the 2020 COVID pandemic, schools shut down. As a result of these shutdowns, many children displayed notable gaps in their learning. In turn, the federal government asked schools to address this learning loss and allocated substantial monies to learning institutions for this express purpose. Districts were encouraged to create and implement plans that would lead to the reduction and elimination of these expansive learning deficits.

The interconnectedness of reading to all subject areas is undeniable. When kids struggle with reading, they often suffer in other academic areas. So, at LCS, we decided to implement a program that would boost reading achievement: Literary Leopards. Through federal funds, our children in grades K-6 will receive materials and supplies that enable them to read high-interest books at their reading level every day with their families.

Is learning to read well that important?

Reading at home is proven to improve educational skills in the most significant of ways. When kids read a lot and often, their spelling, grammar, mechanics, vocabulary, fluency, comprehension, and writing skills improve. Thereby, their overall academic achievement improves. Studies have shown that reading also strengthens the brain, can increase empathy, prevents cognitive decline, reduces stress, aids sleep, and can alleviate depression. We get so much bang for our buck when kids read. Please join us in this crucial endeavor. Parental involvement and a show of high expectations are vital to the success of this initiative and are the most impactful way to help your child's learning progress.
