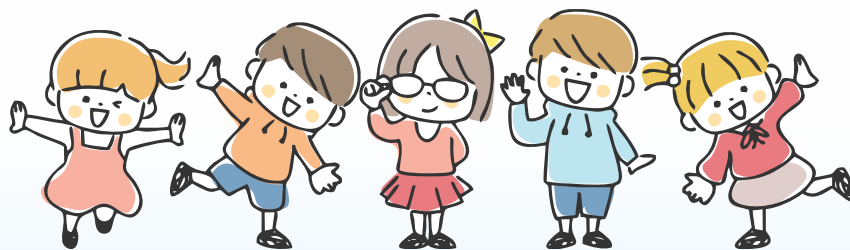

From the Superintendent

I hope this message finds you all well. Fingers crossed that the recent stretch of warm weather we have seen continues!

We are getting closer to having our budget finalized for the 2025-2026 school year. At the time this article is being written we still have not received a “one house” budget from the State Legislature and no agreement has been reached with the Governor. The Board of Education will make a final decision on a tax levy increase when we are given more solid numbers by New York State, but is always cognizant of the desire to keep taxes as low as possible for our residents while still sustaining our staff and programs for students. Our “tax levy limit” calculated by New York State is 8.2%, but I assure you that the Board of Education and I have no intention of remotely approaching that percentage with the proposed tax levy that we present to the public.

At the present time our anticipated budget for 2025-2026 is \$12,202,584. This represents a 3.39% budget increase from 2024-2025, which is a smaller increase than the 5.96% increase from 2023-24 to 2024-2025. This is not the proposed tax levy increase, it is simply the proposed increase in our budget from the current year to 2025-2026.

We are also finalizing the scope of the capital improvements project that we hope to have on the ballot in May. This project would address many of the issues documented in our state-mandated Building Condition Survey.

Here are some of the more important items that we plan to address:


1. Replacement of the main parking lot;
2. Renovation of Room 213 to create an elementary science room;

3. Replacement of the fire alarm system;
4. PA system upgrades in the 2007 section of the building;
5. Replacement of three main Heat Recovery Units and other HVAC work within the building;
6. Replacement of the elementary playground;
7. Replacement of scoreboards in the gym and at the Factory Grounds soccer field;
8. Replacement of some kitchen equipment and the fire suppression system in the kitchen;
9. Replacement of the heating system at the bus garage.

At the present time the total cost of the project is estimated at \$11,515,000. Between state aid (85.7% of project costs) and the use of \$950,000 from our capital reserve fund created in 2009 there will be no additional tax impact on residents for this project. More information will be available when I present our budget to the public at the community budget meeting on Tuesday, April 22 and the mandated budget hearing on Tuesday, May 6. Both of those meetings will be held at 7:00 p.m. in our multipurpose room.

I would like to wish our spring sports teams good luck as they begin practices and to our winter guard program as they conclude their show season! I look forward to seeing you at the Drama Club production of *Spamalot* and other events that our amazing students are participating in!

NOTICE OF ANNUAL MEETING, BUDGET VOTE, BOARD ELECTION, BUS/VEHICLE PURCHASE, CREATION OF CAPITAL RESERVE FUND, AND CAPITAL PROJECT

NOTICE is hereby given that a public budget hearing of the qualified voters of the Laurens Central School District, Otsego County, Laurens, NY, will be held in the MPR at the Laurens Central School Building located at 55 Main Street, Laurens, NY 13796 in said District, on May 6, 2025 at 7:00 p.m.

NOTICE is hereby given, that the annual meeting of the qualified voters of the Laurens Central School District, towns of Laurens, et al, Otsego County, NY, will be held at the Laurens Central School located at 55 Main Street, Laurens, NY 13796, in the said District on Tuesday, May 20, 2025. Voting will take place between the hours of 12:00 and 8:00 p.m. at which time the polls will be opened to vote by ballot (either machine or paper) on the following Propositions:

1. To adopt the annual budget of the School District for the fiscal year 2025-2026, and to authorize the requisite portion thereof to be raised by taxation on the taxable property of the District.
2. To elect one (1) member of the Board for a five-year term commencing July 1, 2025, and expiring on June 30, 2030, Incumbent, Margaret Wikoff.
3. To authorize the Laurens Central School District to undertake the acquisition of one (1) sixty-five (65) passenger school bus with the total cost not to exceed \$178,657.78 for the purpose of transporting students to both regular and special programs. The source of funds shall be the District's Bus Reserve Fund.
4. To allow for the creation of the District's "2025 Reserve Fund" (the "Fund"), with the ultimate amount of the Fund to be \$3,000,000 and the probable term of the Fund to be ten (10) years, in order to allow the District to manage its purchases for the District's programs as in the past, as well as allow for any remaining funds in the 2009 Reserve Fund to be transferred to the newly created Fund.
5. To authorize the Laurens Central School District to undertake a district wide capital project consisting of: the reconstruction and renovation of, and the construction of improvements and upgrades to, various District buildings and facilities (and the sites thereof) to implement various health, safety, accessibility and code compliance measures and various other measures included and generally described in (but not to be limited by) the Project Plan that was referred to in the public notice of the vote on this proposition (the "Project"), and to expend therefor, including for preliminary costs and costs incidental thereto and to the financing thereof, an amount not to exceed the estimated maximum cost of \$11,515,000; (b) the Board

is authorized to expend toward such Project \$950,000 from the District's Capital Reserve Fund; (c) a tax is hereby voted in an amount not to exceed \$10,565,000 to finance the balance of the estimated maximum cost of the Project, such tax to be levied and collected in installments in such years and in such amounts as shall be determined by the Board; (d) in anticipation of such tax, obligations of the District are hereby authorized to be issued in an aggregate principal amount of not to exceed \$10,565,000, and a tax is hereby voted to pay the interest on such obligations as the same shall become due and payable; and (e) New York State Building Aid funds expected to be received by the District are anticipated to offset a substantial part of such costs, and such funds, to the extent received, shall be applied to offset and reduce the amount of taxes herein authorized to be levied

NOTICE IS HEREBY FURTHER GIVEN that an Environmental Assessment Form has been completed for the Project, which is an unlisted action under the State Environmental Quality Review Act ("SEQRA"), a thorough review of the Project's potential environmental impacts has been undertaken, it has been found that the Project will not result in a significant adverse impact on the environment, and a reasoned elaboration of the SEQRA review and findings has been provided in a Negative Declaration.

AND FURTHER NOTICE is hereby given that a copy of the statement of the amount of money which will be required to fund the School District's budget for 2025-2026, exclusive of public monies, may be obtained by any resident of the District during business hours during the 14 days preceding the date of the annual meeting and election, and on the date of the election at the Laurens Central School main office or district office (except Saturday, Sunday, or holidays).

AND FURTHER NOTICE is hereby given that petitions nominating candidates for the office of member of the Board of Education shall be filed with the Clerk of said School District at her office in the Laurens Central School, not later than Monday, April 21, 2025, between 9:00 a.m. and 5:00 p.m. Each petition shall be directed to the Clerk of the District, and shall be signed by at least 25 voters of the District, and must state the name and residence of the candidate. The petition must also identify the specific seat for which the candidate is running, including the name of the incumbent, and the length of the term of office to be filled. Candidates may be nominated for only one vacancy.

AND FURTHER NOTICE is hereby given that the applications for absentee ballots will be obtainable between the hours of 7:30 a.m. and 3:30 p.m. Monday through Friday, except holidays, from the District Clerk. Completed appli-

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cations must be received by the District Clerk at least (7) days before the election if the ballot is to be mailed to the voter, or the day before the election if the ballot is to be picked up personally by the voter at the District Office. Absentee ballots must be received by the District Clerk not later than 5:00 p.m. on Tuesday, May 20, 2025.

A list of persons to whom absentee ballots are issued will be available for inspection to qualified voters of the District in the office of the District clerk between the hours of 7:30 a.m. and 3:30 p.m. during each of the five days prior to the election, except Sundays, and said list will be posted at the polling place at the election. Any qualified voter present in the polling place may object to the voting of the ballot upon appropriate grounds for making his/her challenge and reason therefore known to the Inspector of Election before the close of the polls.

AND FURTHER NOTICE is hereby given that the applications for early mail ballots will be obtainable between the hours of 7:30 a.m. and 3:30 p.m. Monday through Friday, except holidays, from the District Clerk, no earlier than 30 days before the election. Completed applications must be received by the District Clerk at least (7) days before the election if the ballot is to be mailed to the voter, or the day before the election if the ballot is to be picked up personally by the voter at the District Office. Early mail ballots must be received by the District Clerk not later than 5:00 p.m. on Tuesday, May 20, 2025.

A list of persons to whom early mail ballots are issued will be available for public inspection in the office of the District clerk between the hours of 7:30 a.m. and 3:30 p.m. during each of the five days prior to the election,

except Sundays, and said list will be posted at the polling place at the election. Any qualified voter present in the polling place may object to the voting of the ballot upon appropriate grounds for making his/her challenge and reason therefore known to the Inspector of Election before the close of the polls.

AND FURTHER NOTICE that military voters who are qualified voters of the School District may apply for a military ballot by requesting an application from the District Clerk at (607) 432-2050, or pweir@laurenses.org. For a military voter to be issued a military ballot, the District Clerk must have received a valid ballot application no later than 5:00 pm on April 25, 2025. In a request for a military ballot application or ballot, the military voter may indicate their preference for receiving the application or ballot by mail, facsimile transmission or electronic mail.

AND FURTHER NOTICE is hereby given, that any proposition that is required to be included for vote shall be submitted in writing by means of a petition signed by at least 25 qualified voters, stating the residence of each signer, which proposition shall be filed with the Clerk not later than April 21, 2025, unless a greater number of days is required by statute. Any proposition shall be rejected by the Board of Education if the purpose of the proposition is not within the powers of the voters or where the expenditure of monies is required for the proposition, and such proposition fails to include the necessary specific appropriation.

Key Club News

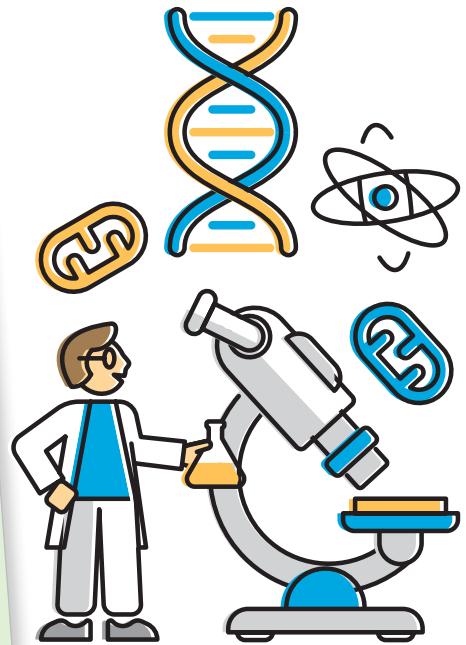

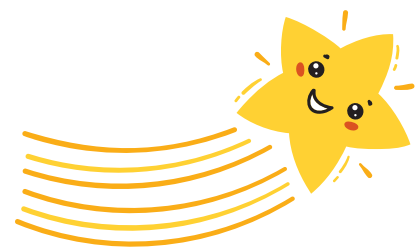
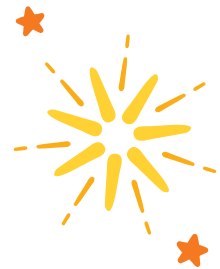

Head Lice Reminder and Tips

Please periodically check your child (especially in grades PK-6) for head lice. The truth is, head lice are always present, any time of year, just like colds and tummy viruses. The difference is, they're BUGS, so they're easier to SEE! You can try a once a week schedule, either while shampooing your child or during a movie, to take a little time to look for critters.



If you're not sure what you're looking for, this is a great resource http://www.youtube.com/watch?v=UrScqdNuTpc&feature=more_related. This video will help you identify lice and their nits, and instruct you on how to get rid of them and prevent further infestations.

By the time we know children have head lice, they've already been infested for at least a few weeks, and often longer. This makes it next to impossible to try to "track down" where your child "got lice". Because lice don't jump or fly, they are most commonly transferred by the direct sharing of hair care products and prolonged head to head contact. Another common culprit is sleepovers. If your child goes to a sleepover, have them bring their own pillow and sleeping bag.

What we know about head lice has changed a lot since we were in school. This resource: <https://identify.us.com/> can answer ANY questions you might have about lice (as well as other household pests). Founder Richard J. Pollack, Ph.D. has earned many degrees in Entomology and holds a degree from Cornell University in Medical Parasitology (M.Sc.) He has served as a public health entomologist at the Harvard School of Public Health for 22 years. His informational websites at the Harvard School of Public Health were amongst the most viewed sites hosted there.
