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## Letter from the Superintendent

Dear Residents of the Laurens Central School District:
The primary focus of this newsletter is to provide you with accurate information about the proposed budget for the upcoming school year and the other items upon which we will soon be voting.

The Board of Education and I are cognizant of the impacts that inflation, interest rates and other economic indicators have had on our residents and local economy and, as we did last year, have taken that into account when preparing the 2023-2024 budget. While federal COVID relief funding has alleviated some potential issues over the past two years, that funding expires shortly and the future of New York State education funding over the next three to five years is still uncertain. As a result we feel that we are proactively taking appropriate steps to weather difficult times while still providing the highest quality educational experience possible for our students.

## DATE AND TIME OF VOTE

The annual budget vote and school board election has been scheduled for May 16, 2023 between the hours of 12:00 p.m. and 8:00 p.m. at Laurens Central School, Room 101.

## REQUIRED PUBLIC HEARING

The required public hearing on this year's proposed budget will be held on May 2, 2023 at 7:00pm in the Multipurpose Room.

## ABSENTEE BALLOTS

Absentee ballots for qualified voters may be requested by contacting the District Clerk by email at pweir@laurenscs.org or by calling the District Clerk at 607-432-2050. Absentee ballots can be requested up to seven (7) days before the vote if they are to be returned by mail or by 5:00 on the day preceding the vote if they are going to be returned in person. To be counted, all properly completed absentee ballots must be properly filled out and received in the Office of the District Clerk by 5:00 p.m. on May 16, 2023. The names of all individuals requesting an absentee ballot will be posted on the District web site for voter review.

## MILITARY BALLOTS

Military voters who are qualified voters of the School District may apply for a military ballot by requesting an application from the District Clerk at (607) 432-2050, or pweir@ laurenscs.org. For a military voter to be issued a military ballot, the District Clerk must have received a valid ballot application no later than $5: 00 \mathrm{pm}$ on April 21, 2023. In a request for a military ballot application or ballot, the military voter may indicate their preference for receiving the application or ballot by mail, facsimile transmission or electronic mail.

## QUALIFIED VOTER

A qualified voter is a person who is a citizen of the United States, at least eighteen years of age, a resident of the District for at least 30 days prior to the date of the election, and who is not otherwise ineligible to vote under the provisions of section 5-106 of the Election Law (e.g. a person who has been adjudged to be mentally incompetent by a court).

## Budget Development Process

As a school district that relies heavily on state aid, planning a budget that meets the educational needs of our students while at the same time being sensitive to the needs of our taxpayers and residents can be a challenge.

The Board of Education and I have looked at every aspect of the budget with a commitment to reducing or containing costs in as many areas as possible. We are confident that the budget being presented will accomplish three important goals: 1) Provide sound educational programs for our students; 2) be affordable to the community; and 3) continue to plan for the long term financial stability of the District.

We are proposing a budget that will require a tax levy increase of $2.00 \%$. At this time we anticipate using $\$ 251,621$ of fund balance and are anticipating the use of $\$ 70,000$ of reserve funding to balance the budget. While the use of fund balance and reserve funds could change based on new information that we receive about state aid and the new state budget, the proposed tax levy increase will remain at $2.00 \%$.

We feel that you will be voting on a budget that reflects the needs of our students, our staff and the community and that you will be supporting a school that has a history of providing an excellent education for our students. Thank you for your continued commitment to the children of our District.

## 2022-2023 School Budget and Propositions

- In person voting will take place at Laurens Central School, Room 101, on May 16, 2023 between the hours of 12:00 p.m. and 8:00 p.m.
- Absentee Ballots must be received by the District Clerk by $5: 00 \mathrm{pm}$ on May 16, 2023.
- Residents will have the opportunity to vote on three propositions, those being:


## PROPOSITION \#1 - BASIC BUDGET

At the time this newsletter is being written we are asking that the Board be authorized to expend the sum of $\mathbf{\$ 1 0 , 9 7 4 , 5 2 5}$ for the 20232024 school year budget.

This will require a tax levy increase of $\mathbf{2 . 0 0 \%}$.
The total budget number could change based on additional information that comes out about the recently passed State budget.

## PROPOSITION \#2 - BOARD OF EDUCATION ELECTION CANDIDATES FOR THE BOARD OF EDUCATION

To elect one member of the Board for a five year term commencing July 1, 2023 and expiring on June 30, 2028, Incumbent Thomas Francisco.

## PROPOSITION \#3 - SCHOOL BUS PURCHASE

RESOLVED, that the Board of Education of the Laurens Central School District undertake the acquisition of one (1) 65 passenger school bus. The bus will be used for the transportation of students to both regular and special education programs, field trips and extracurricular activities. The bus will be paid for in full by funds from the Bus Reserve; there will be no impact on the tax levy from this purchase.

## Bus Purchase

We are asking for voter approval to purchase one 65 passenger bus. The bus will be paid for through the Bus Reserve. There will be no impact on the Tax Levy or budget.

The new bus will replace bus 82 . Bus 82 has over 64,200 miles on it. The purchase of the new bus will help us maintain a 7-8 year replacement cycle for our bus fleet. As buses age the DOT required body work will cost more to repair the bus than to purchase the bus new. As with all vehicles, as the bus ages it will have increased maintenance costs.

The new bus will be used to transport regular and special education students. It will also be used for field trips, athletic and other extracurricular activities. We anticipate receiving $\$ 2,500$ for the trade-in of Bus 82 .

## FINANCES FOR THE BUS PURCHASE

The bus will be paid for entirely out of the bus reserve.

There will be no tax impact as a result of this purchase.

## The Contingency Budget

As in years past the State provides a formula that Districts must use to calculate their Contingency Budget. Districts must report a Contingency Budget in the event that the proposed budget is defeated twice. Should we need to adopt a contingency budget our tax levy must remain the same as the previous year.

## Closing Thoughts

I want to take the opportunity to thank each and every resident for their continued support of our students and our school, even as school districts and families experience difficult financial circumstances. It demonstrates that our residents value education and I am proud to call our District home!

## 5th Grade Fiesta

In March, the fifth grade class taught by Ms. Smith held a fiesta to wrap up their quarter study of the book, Esperanza Rising by Pam Munoz Ryan.

The story follows a Mexican family who falls on hard times, so that they must immigrate to California to find work on a corporate crops farm. The plot follows the steady rise of their fortunes through many a setback and much perseverance. Esperanza Ortega's very name, "hope," is significant throughout. In addition to reading the story that was inspired by the author's grandmother's life, the class had some lessons on daily life in 1930s America during the Great Depression, the plight of the migrant Mexican workers, the equally desperate situation of the Okies who fled the dustbowl of the Midwest to seek livelihood in California, the "black blizzards" that stripped the Midwest topsoil and dumped it all over the United States, and the Repatriation policy that deported Mexicans and MexicanAmerican U.S. citizens, alike.

To prepare for the fiesta, the students learned about how to set a table and made Mexican flag placemats that were laminated as keepsakes. They set up a banquet table with their desks and had a leisurely lunchtime meal. There were very few leftovers!

Taking inspiration from the book, the fiesta featured main dishes generously and skillfully prepared by Mrs. Lyons' high school Cultural Foods class. These included enchiladas and papas con chorizo, potatoes and Mexican pork sausage with jalapeno. A delicious flan de almendras, almond flan, was our dessert. There was also an array of fresh fruits and vegetables to sample, all from the chapter titles of the book.

For a surprise finale, the class had one more fun feature from the book: a traditional colorful pinata stuffed with caramels!

Hopefully they will all remember this meaningful book and the celebration that was held, as a highlight of their school days.

## News from the Nurse . . .TICK TIME!

This time of year kids spend a lot of time outside and ticks are everywhere! It's a good idea to check your child's skin daily, from head to toe. Below is some helpful information.

## TICK REMOVAL: A STEP-BY-STEP GUIDE

First, don't panic. It's true that Lyme disease is the most common tick-borne disease in the United States, but your child's risk of developing Lyme disease after being bitten by a tick is very low. To be safe, though, you'll want to remove the tick as soon as possible because risk of infection increases between 24 to 48 hours after the tick attaches to the skin.

## WHAT TO DO

Step 1: Use tweezers to grasp the tick firmly at its head or mouth, next to the skin.
Step 2: Pull firmly and steadily until the tick lets go of the skin. Do not twist the tick or rock it from side to side. If part of the tick stays in the skin, don't worry. It will eventually come out on its own.

Step 3: Release the tick into a jar or zip-locked bag in case you want to have it identified later on.
Step 4: Wash your hands and the site of the bite with soap and water.
Step 5: Swab the bite site with alcohol.
Never use petroleum jelly or a hot match to kill and remove a tick. These methods don't get the tick off the skin, and can cause the insect to burrow deeper and release more saliva (which increases the chances of disease transmission).

REMOVING A TICK


Grasp and pull.


Swab and check the area.


Save the tick.

## NEXT STEPS

Call your doctor after the tick has been removed to find out if your child should be evaluated. In certain cases, a doctor will prescribe antibiotics if a child is at high risk of developing Lyme disease.

Call the doctor right away if your child develops a red-ringed rash or if the skin becomes red and irritated. Also call if your child has flu-like symptoms, joint pain or a swollen joint, or facial paralysis. Although other conditions can cause similar symptoms, you'll want to have your child evaluated early on so that if it is Lyme disease, treatment can begin as soon as possible.
