From the Superintendent

PLEASE NOTE

- Parents of elementary students should look for information to come home about celebrating the 100th day of school.
- Check out the activity schedule and come to a Basketball game. All of our teams will appreciate your support.
- There will be a half day of school for all students on February 7. Parent/ Teacher conferences for all grade levels will be held that afternoon. Be sure to schedule an appointment.
- Looking ahead to March, our annual Contrast of Colors is scheduled to be held on Saturday, March 9.

Of course, February is also the time when schools begin to learn about the Governor's plans for our state and our educational system. As of this writing, schools are waiting for Governor Hochul to present her Executive Budget, which will outline state aid for schools. We hope that the Governor's budget will address fiscal disparities between urban and rural school districts and that rural schools receive the increase in aid that we feel we need to maintain the programming that we provide for students. When our state aid runs are released we will be able to move forward with our budget planning process for 2024-2025.

One area that is of great concern to me as we look at the long-term fiscal health of the District is the mandate to move to zero-emission buses. According to the law, all new bus purchases are supposed to be zero-emission beginning in 2027 and all school bus fleets are required to be zero-emission by 2035.

This presents multiple problems for school districts across the state:

- Bus manufacturers cannot keep up with demand;
- A zero-emission bus costs at least three times our current price for a new school bus;
- Bus facilities would need to be renovated or rebuilt to accommodate zero-emission buses and install charging stations;
- We have not been given firm information as to whether or not our current power grid can support the electric needs required to charge zero-emission buses.

There are serious questions about things like long-distance field trips, the effect of zero-emission bus heating on battery life, and the disposal of the lithium-ion batteries when they reach end-of-life status.

These are just a few of the problems that we are facing with this law. We have consulted with our architects and fiscal advisors and replacing all of our buses plus renovating our bus garage would cost the District in the neighborhood of \$7.5 MILLION DOLLARS. This would not include upgrading any electrical service. The grant funding being offered by the EPA and the State of New York is woefully inadequate and will not even come close to meeting the needs of over 700 school districts across the state, which would total approximately \$50 billion dollars for buses alone.

While no one will argue with a desire to preserve and protect our environment, I feel that the passage of this law was unconscionable and places all of our Districts at risk of great financial peril. I urge you to contact your local and state legislators to express your concerns about the effects it will have on our ability to provide quality educational programs for our students.

As always I thank you for your support and your continued involvement with our school and our community.

Laurens Central School 14th Annual Athletic Hall of Fame Induction Ceremony

1ST INDUCTEE: RYAN KEATOR—ATHLETE

Ryan graduated from LCS in 2003 and participated in soccer, basketball, and track and field. At the time of his graduation Ryan had earned the most points of any LCS track and field athlete over his six-year varsity career. He also held school records in the 100 meter dash, 400 meter run, 1600 meter relay, distance medley relay, and the high jump relay.

In addition to his school records, Ryan was a Tri-Valley or Section IV Class D champion in the following events:

- 400 meter relay
- High Jump
- 200 meter dash
- 400 meter run
- 100 meter run

2ND INDUCTEE: MICHAEL DUTCHER-CONTRIBUTOR

Mike is a member of the LCS Class of 1987 and participated in soccer, basketball, and baseball.

Beginning in 1991 Mike coached multiple sports at Franklin Central School, including girls' modified soccer, boys' JV and varsity basketball, and girls' varsity basketball, where he would have the biggest impact on the Franklin athletic program. His teams won six Tri-Valley championships, three Section IV Class D championships, and a trip to the State Final Four in 2022.

Mike was twice named the Daily Star Coach of The Year for Girls' Basketball and is a 2022 inductee into the Tri-Valley Hall of Fame. If there was one word I would use to describe Mike as a coach it would be "class." He has always conducted himself respectfully towards his own players, his opponents, and officials and his character embodies the ideals that our Athletic Hall of Fame looks for in its members.

3RD INDUCTEE: DAVID MILLER-COACH

Dave was a PE teacher at Laurens and coached boys' varsity soccer, girls' varsity basketball, and assisted with track and field.

Under Dave's leadership the boys' varsity soccer team established itself as one of the powerhouse programs in our region. He amassed a career record of 354 wins vs. 181 losses and 43 ties. His teams won six Tri-Valley championships (2000, 2001, 2002, 2006, 2008, 2019), four Section IV Class D Championships (2000, 2001, 2004, 2006), two regional championships, and two trips to the State Final Four.

Dave was one of the most respected coaches in our area and was rewarded for his efforts with the Daily Star Boys' Soccer Coach of the Year Award in both 2000 and 2004. He is also a member of the Tri-Valley Hall of Fame. His players, some of whom he stays in touch with to this day, would tell you that he pushed them to be their best athletically while still showing that he cared about them as human beings first and foremost and was invested in their future success.




JED Suicide Prevention News



The JED Foundation is a non-profit organization that works with schools and colleges across the nation to prevent suicide and improve and protect the mental health of our nation's youth. Laurens Central School is fortunate enough to have begun working with the JED Foundation last spring. The first step in our 3-year journey with JED was to conduct a survey that the faculty, staff, and students in grades 7-12 took part in anonymously in June, 2023.

On November 8 of this year, Mr. Mushtare, Mrs. Lyons and Mrs. Cox hosted guests, Jennifer Reed and Samantha Mitchell, who visited us from the JED Foundation. After a tour of the building, the group spent the day poring over and analyzing the data that was collected from the survey. It was discovered that Laurens Central School is doing many things already to support our students' mental health and to prevent suicide. Two of those things are the Flex Period that was implemented this year in grades 7-12, and the Laurens Central School Suicide Prevention Manual that was created in recent years. There was also a discussion of what other actions could be taken by LCS to promote mental and emotional well-being in our student body.

Look for more information in the future of what LCS is doing, with the guidance of the JED Foundation, to encourage and ensure positive mental health in our youth!


