From the Superintendent

I hope this message finds you all well and that our March is as mild as our January and February have been so far. Wishful thinking, I'm sure!

We are getting closer to having our budget for 2024-2025 ready to present to the public. The Board of Education will make a final decision on a tax levy increase when we are given more solid numbers by New York State, but is always cognizant of the desire to keep taxes as low as possible for our residents while still sustaining our staff and programs for students.

One factor that is affecting budget development in many small rural school districts like ours is the Governor's inclusion of "transition aid" as part of her Executive Budget proposal. The Governor and her team feel that since rural schools are losing enrollment they no longer need as much in state education aid. As you see in your everyday lives, costs rarely go down and are almost always increasing for everything. For approximately two decades schools have been held "save harmless" and have never received less in aid than they did in the prior year. Most of our districts are heavily reliant on state aid, so any reduction will force districts to make difficult choices. I am confident that due to years of sound fiscal management LCS will be able to weather the storm for the 24-25 fiscal year, but further reductions in upcoming school years could be potentially devastating for student programming.

I want to commend Senator Peter Oberacker for his support, his speech about rural education funding and his advocacy for the students in his constituency.

Students who are in danger of losing course credit or not meeting the mandated attendance policy have been receiving letters from the school nurse. I encourage you to contact Mr. Mushtare as soon as possible if you have received one of these letters so that you can develop a plan of action to improve your child's attendance. It is my hope that instances where we need to deny credit because of attendance are fewer and farther between as we approach the end of the school year.

Congratulations to our girls' varsity basketball team on their successful season as they enter sectional play. I would like to wish our spring sports teams good luck as they begin practices and to our winter guard program as they conclude their show season! Be sure to check out the annual "Contrast of Colors" on March 9.

From the Principal

NEW YORK STATE ASSESSMENTS

New York State exams for grades 3-8 will begin Wednesday April 10, 2024. The state exams in grades 3-8 do not determine the promotion or retention of students, nor are they used to determine final grades. The purpose of these assessments is "to help teachers identify individual strengths and weaknesses, and to use this information to better plan for and prepare instruction." It is extremely important to know what learning students have mastered so that we can plan to close any learning gaps that students may have developed.

New York State is transitioning to Computer Based Testing beginning this year. 5th and 8th grade students will be required to take their state exams on computers. In January, 5th and 8th grade students participated in a test simulation which allowed student to become familiar with the computer based testing platform. In the spring of 2026 all students will be taking 3-8 state tests on the computer.

Parents can help their children prepare for the state exams in a variety of ways. Students perform better on exams when they have had a good night's rest the night before the test. Children also perform at higher levels when they have a good breakfast on the day of the exam. Parents should also encourage their children to do their best on each exam but avoid adding any unnecessary pressure before the test.

While we highly recommend that all students take the state assessments, parents have the right to "opt out" of the exams. Parents who wish to have their children opt out of these tests must submit a letter in writing to Mr. Mushtare stating that you intend to refuse the tests on behalf of your child, and indicate if you are opting out of the ELA, Math, Science (5th and 8th grade only), or all three of the exams. If possible, please submit any "opt out" letters to Mr. Mushtare by April 8, 2024.

Clark Scholarships will be announced sometime in late March or early April. If you have a college student who is currently receiving a Clark Scholarship, a copy of his/her first semester grades should be sent to the Scholarship Office. At the end of the second semester, grades should also be sent. 6TH AND 8TH GRADE PARENT NIGHTS

The 8th Grade Parent Night will be held in April or May to review graduation and testing requirements and 9th grade schedules. The 6th Grade Parent Night will also be held in April or May. During this meeting we will discuss testing, 7th grade course and junior high requirements and 7th grade schedules. School staff and faculty will also share curriculum, programming and services available for students. Parents will be notified in the future, giving the time, location and dates of these meetings. The dates will also be posted in future newsletters.

NEW VISIONS AND CTE/BOCES

10th graders will be taking a field trip to BOCES on March 7th or 8th. Soon after this trip, first year applications for CTE programs will become available. Applications will be due within a few weeks afterward. Some programs, such as Welding and NRO, are very popular and more selective. Current grades and attendance will be a strong factor in consideration of applications. For juniors interested in applying for the New Visions programs, those applications are due by the middle of March and require letters of recommendation and short essays.




