From the Superintendent

We are getting closer to having our budget for the 2025-2026 school year ready to present to the public. The Board of Education will make a final decision on a tax levy increase when we are given more solid numbers by New York State, but is always cognizant of the desire to keep taxes as low as possible for our residents while still sustaining our staff and programs for students.

Governor Hochul's Executive Budget for 2025-2026 did not propose the cuts in state education aid that we were fearing when the 2024-2025 Executive Budget was released last January. While LCS would be receiving a small increase in state aid should the final budget numbers be close to the Governor's proposal, the increase would still not cover the rising costs that our schools are facing for everything from food to fuel and for student programming both inside and outside of our District. Our Board of Education has always been diligent about spending and I have no doubt that we will work together to develop a budget that takes those rising expenses into account.

We are also finalizing the scope of a potential capital improvements project to propose to the public for a vote in May. Again, we take our responsibilities to the taxpayers very seriously and we have been working with our architects, construction management company and fiscal advisors to present a project that will come at no additional tax impact to our residents while still addressing issues identified in our mandated Building Condition Survey.

Students who are in danger of losing course credit or not meeting the mandated attendance policy have been receiving letters from the school nurse. I encourage you to contact Mr. Mushtare as soon as possible if you have received one of these letters so that you can develop a plan of action to improve your child's attendance. It is my hope that instances where we need to deny credit because of attendance are fewer and farther between as we approach the end of the school year.

Congratulations to our girls' varsity basketball team on their successful season as they enter sectional play. I would like to wish our spring sports teams good luck as they begin practices and to our winter guard program as they conclude their show season!



From the Principal

NEW YORK STATE ASSESSMENTS

New York State exams for grades 3-8 will begin Tuesday, April 8, 2025. The state exams in grades 3-8 do not determine the promotion or retention of students, nor are they used to determine final grades. The purpose of these assessments is "to help teachers identify individual strengths and weaknesses, and to use this information to better plan for and prepare instruction." It is extremely important to know what learning students have mastered so that we can plan to close any learning gaps that students may have developed.

All Laurens students will be participating in Computer-Based Testing beginning this year. In January, LCS students participated in a test simulation which allowed students to become familiar with the computer-based testing platform. Students will be taking computer-based practice tests in February and March to prepare for the exams.

Parents can help their children prepare for the state exams in a variety of ways. Students perform better on exams when they have had a good night's rest the night before the test. Children also perform at higher levels when they have a good breakfast on the day of the exam. Parents should also encourage their children to do their best on each exam but avoid adding any unnecessary pressure before the test.

While we highly recommend that all students take the state assessments, parents have the right to "opt out" of the exams. Parents who wish to have their children opt out of these tests must submit a letter in writing to Mr. Mushtare stating that you intend to refuse the tests on behalf of your child, and indicate if you are opting out of the ELA, Math, Science (5th and 8th grade only), or all three of the exams. If possible, please submit any "opt out" letters to Mr. Mushtare by April 4, 2025.

**If you plan to sign your child/children out after the assembly, PLEASE send in a note or call the main office by that morning. This greatly helps us with dismissal time.






